Lowering Your Risk of Preeclampsia

What Is Preeclampsia?

Preeclampsia is a disease that can occur in pregnancy. It most often happens after you're 20 weeks pregnant or soon after the baby is born. Blood pressure can go very high. It affects organs like the brain, liver, and kidneys. Your baby may be born early. It can also cause health problems for both you and your baby later in life.



Good News! Low-Dose Aspirin Can Help.

Taking low-dose aspirin can lower your preeclampsia risk. You can start this treatment between 12 to 28 weeks of pregnancy, the earlier the better.



Your current or past health can increase your risk of preeclampsia. These include having diabetes or high blood pressure, your age, and your weight. Your doctor or midwife can check your risk factors to see if low-dose aspirin is right for you. Don't start taking it your own.

Yes, as long as you take it as ordered by your doctor or midwife. It will not cause birth defects or other problems. But never give aspirin to babies, children, or teens. It can cause them to get sick.
